Happy Feast of the great Hieromartyr St. Josaphat!



Little-known fact? Some accounts say that we can be **grateful to the Jewish people** for helping out the Ukrainian people on the day of St. Josaphat's martyrdom. Today, November 12th, we celebrate the Feast of St. Josaphat. And this is the story: Intense emotions between the those Christians who wanted to reestablish their unity with Rome and those who did not boiled up and overflowed on the day he died, in 1623. One account has this summary:

"At a relatively young age, upon becoming both bishop of Vitebsk and archbishop of Polotsk, Josaphat faced a difficult situation. Most monks, fearing interference in liturgy and customs, did not want union with Rome. By synods, catechetical instruction, reform of the clergy, and personal example, however, Josaphat was successful in convincing the greater part of the faithful in that area of the grace of the union. He led by example and instituted changes that helped clergy and laity alike live more faithfully.

"Some radical opposing bishops took up residence in the same area and set up and opposition hierarchy. These spread the accusation that Josaphat had abandoned his own tradition and had "gone Latin" and that all his people would have to do the same. Sadly enough, he was not enthusiastically supported at the time by the Roman Catholic bishops of Poland. Josaphat was unfairly discredited. He tried to calm the troubles by speaking out, knowing full well that it might cost him his life. "If I am counted worthy of martyrdom," he said, "then I am not afraid to die."

TELL ME SOMETHING I DON'T ALREADY KNOW

If someone came running to you and said he saw Jesus!.... would you run along with him to go see?

Someone DID come to King Louis IX of France (known now as Saint Louis IX) shouting just that.

"Your majesty.... come quickly -- there is something happening at the church... a great miracle!" he panted.

"What kind of miracle?"

"A great miracle! A priest is saying Mass, and everyone just saw, just as he raised the Host at consecration, they are seeing Jesus Himself on the altar! Quick, hurry before He disappears!"

The king remained very quiet, so quiet that the messenger was surprised. "Your majesty, why aren't you saying anything? Aren't you coming?"

"No", replied the king. "Let the ones who doubt that it is Jesus on the altar, run to see. As for me, even if I saw Jesus on the altar in His visible human form, and touched Him with my hand, and heard His voice, I would not be any more convinced than I am now. **Because I know that He is present in the consecrated Host.** My faith is sufficient for me. I need no miracle."

<u>Application</u>: The faith of King Louis IX was so strong that he did not need any visions of Our Lord to prove that the colour, taste, weight and shape were only the appearances of bread and wine, but that Jesus, with His Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, is really contained, offered and received under these appearances. He believed this because Jesus said so, and Jesus is the Son of God... He is Eternal Truth.

Try to imitate this faith of St. Louis by going to Holy Mass and Communion frequently, and by visiting the Blessed Sacrament as often as you are able to do so. Your actions will be a proof that you need no miracle either, to prove your faith in the Holy Eucharist!

TALK TO ST. JOSEPH -- HE WILL HELP YOU DIE HAPPILY!

A Venetian merchant had the habit of daily visiting an image of St. Joseph which stood in a niche at the comer of one of the streets of the town in which he lived.



Falling sick of a dangerous illness, which brought him to the brink of the grave, St. Joseph appeared to him as his last moments approached. At the sight of the Saint, towards whom he had ever been so devout, the sick man was filled with consolation, but above all his conscience became so enlightened, that in an instant he seemed to perceive clearly all the sins of his past life, and in their full heinousness and guilt; while at the same time he felt а new and exceeding great contrition, together with the sweetest hope of pardon.

He quickly sent for a priest, made a fresh and fervent confession, and having received absolution, full of peace and joy, piously expired in our Lord.

ST JOSAPHAT... "He urged patience and forbearance among his people, even when they were incited to violence. Despite warnings, he went to Vitebsk, still a hotbed of trouble. Attempts were made to foment trouble and drive him from the eparchy: A priest was sent to shout insults to him from his own courtyard. When Josaphat had him removed and taken to his own home under guard house, the opposition rang the town hall bell, and a mob assembled. The priest was released, but members of the mob broke into the bishop's home. Tensions rose until finally a mob gathered and took him by force — Josaphat was struck with a halberd [an axe] then shot, and his body thrown into the river. It is said that the Jewish people of the city acted heroically amidst the vio-- they risked their own lives to try to protect Josaphat and his friends and servants. These Jews saved many lives and they were the only ones to publicly accuse the killers of Josaphat and mourn his death while the Catholics of the city hid in fear. "Josaphat's death brought a movement toward Catholicism and unity, but the controversy continued, and the dissidents, too, had their martyr. The violence convinced many in the city that things had gone too far, and public opinion moved towards unity. Those leaders that opposed unity, eventually came to reconcile with Rome. "His body was later recovered and is now entombed in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. The relics of St. Josaphat rest the side Altar of St Basil. He was the first saint of the Eastern Church to be canonized by Rome. St. Josaphat is the patron saint of Ukraine. "After the partition of Poland, the Russians forced most Ruthenians to join the Russian Orthodox Church. The ecumenical efforts in the past decades and moments like the 1964 encounter between Pope Paul VI and Patriarch Athenagoras I of Constantinople, mark a significant steps toward the healing of divisions in Christendom that have spanned more than nine centuries. St. Josaphat, who gave your life for the unity of Christians and inspired reconciliation with your death, pray for us!" www.stjosaphatparish.org

KEEPS YOUR SOUL FRESH AND FILLED WITH GRACE "In seminary, one of the things [my bishop] instilled in us as our rector with absolute clarity was this: after you are ordained a Catholic priest, when someone asks you for Confession, the answer is yes. Period. I consider it to be a foundational rule in my life as a priest, and as it turns out, it has proven practical."

[He tells here a story of how he was running a marathon once -- yes, even priests have sports hobbies! -- and as he was running, another runner came up close to him and said, "Hey, Father (the sign on the priest's chest did indeed say "Fr. Rob"), will you hear my confession right now?" The priest

answered immediately, "Sure!" but laughed later to himself at how out of breath he was, while giving the prayer of absolution!]

"We gave our lives to God, and to offer his mercy through the sacrament of Confession is an honor, never a burden, no matter the time or place. While I have never heard of another priest hearing a confession while panting through a half marathon, my brother priests have shared dozens of unique and amazing stories of unusual confessional circumstances (with no details about the person or what was said in the confession, of course), so my story is just one of many. Priests have heard confessions in prisons and schools, on battlefields, in college dorms, and in living rooms. A good buddy of mine was once asked to hear someone's confession while he was eating a Big Mac at an airport!

"My point is this: Go to Confession. When urge and opportunity come together, even if the circumstances seem less-thanperfect, even if you feel like you're missing the booth and the screen, follow where your soul is being led and go to Confession. Be blunt and totally honest—I promise, you won't say anything the priest hasn't heard before. And because confession is always under what is called "the seal," the priest would rather go to prison or even give his own life than reveal anything that you say, no matter the setting. Nothing but mercy awaits you there. Of course, it's great if you can catch confession at the scheduled times at your parish or if your parish has a Lenten or Advent Penance Service (Lent begins on March 2nd this year!), but never believe that asking to go to confession is a burden for a priest; it is our privilege. At the risk of sounding cliché, you are not alone in the fight for holiness; your priests are running this race with you, mile by mile, road by road. We gave our lives to God, and to offer his mercy through the sacrament of Confession is an honor, never a burden, no matter the time or place." Fr. Rob Johnson
